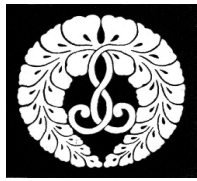

Freedom tastes of reality

This will reach most of you before our Obonfest. I want to thank you in advance for your support of this event. You are just about to, or have just put in a lot of effort for this major fund-raising event. What motivates the members of the Oregon Buddhist Temple to work so hard?

I believe it is primarily a true feeling of gratitude for what you have gained through this temple, through the Buddha-dharma. Sometimes, I fear, Jodo Shinshu ministers speak too much of gratitude in isolation from explaining its motivation. Rennyō Shonin almost always spoke of “gratitude” and “joy” together. If you are joyous due to a promise of liberation made clear to you at this temple, then, it is natural that you feel gratitude. Then it is natural that you will endeavor to help your family, your friends, your temple, and your social organizations. However, many of us don't feel joy 16 – 24 hours out of the day. So, it may be useful to speak of appreciation and gratitude. Whether joyous in each moment or not, appreciating the nembutsu will lead to a life of thankfulness.

Someone who truly appreciates the warm spiritual vision and the genuine community that this temple provides will want to donate to the temple and to the National Organization, the Buddhist Churches of America. If some do not feel that you are being benefited by this temple and its parent organization, it indicates a failure on my part. I wish I might have explained more clearly how the preparation we receive at our graduate school, The Institute of Buddhist Studies has been crucial to my being able to do anything like an adequate job as the Resident Minister of the Oregon Buddhist Temple.

I will come back to what benefits are offered here, at OBT. I am sure that there are many of you who are grateful for the spiritual guidance and the many friendships they have gained through this temple. Many have found their suffering reduced, especially at times of loss, through participation in the life of our temple. Many of us feel we are coming more and more to understand the deep truth about this life through

the guidance of Shinran Shonin and the teachings of Mahayana Buddhism. I like to believe that many of us are coming to live in a happier and more meaningful way thanks to the nurturance received here at the Oregon Buddhist Temple.

I am proud to have been one of the first dozen or so people who sent in a donation to the BCA debt relief. I was only able to send the requested amount \$199. I wish I could have done more, and, if able, I will send additional donations later in the year. Please help us dig out of the debt we are swimming in. If we can pay off the 3.1 million dollars we still owe Calif. Bank and Trust for construction of the Jodo Shinshu center it will save us paying \$17,000 per month in interest. This debt is reducing our ability to train ministers, to train Minister's Assistants, to train lay leaders, etc. The Jodo Shinshu center houses the Institute of Buddhist Studies, the Jodo Shinshu Correspondence Course, the USA branch of Ryukoku University, the Center for Buddhist Education ... it is the center for planning and often the location for our Youth activities, ... it is a very good thing.

Gratitude will be the source of future donations to our temple and to our national organization. Let me again ask, “What is there to be grateful for?” In the preceding paragraph I talked a bit about the many positive functions that the Jodo Shinshu Center provides. In particular I will remind you that as the home of the Institute of Buddhist Studies it is crucial to providing new ministers. Ministers trained at IBS have a very good record for longevity in service to our temples. They also tend to be the ministers with the best reputations for giving interesting, engaging, understandable sermons, or howa. Much good work is done for all of us by our national organization, by the Buddhist Churches of America. If you can help us financially please do. If you helped us with volunteer work at the Obonfest, thank you so much. I truly appreciate the members of this temple. I am proud of your hard work to sustain this spiritual center. I am proud of the way the established members continue to welcome new participants, without regard to their race, cultural background or political leanings. There is no place I would rather be than

Musings of an OBT board member

On the page of every monthly OBT board meeting agenda reads the OBT Mission Statement: "The purpose of the Oregon Buddhist Temple is to ensure that the Jodo Shinshu Sangha have the facilities, resident minister and other resources they need to share the Buddha-Dharma in their daily lives and during their major life events." This statement is an excellent reminder to all of us about what is important about OBT and what we as board members are there to support and perpetuate.

The "nuts and bolts" of the mission are straightforward: facilities, minister and resources. But the underlying purpose is profound: to share the Buddha-Dharma both in our day-to-day existence and at key events in our lives. Ultimately it's about creating the space and the support for a Jodo Shinshu community in Portland - for building and nurturing a Sangha here.

I've been an OBT board member for two years now, and it's truly been an honor to take part in supporting the manifestation of this mission. And we all owe a debt of gratitude to the generations of OBT Sangha members and leaders who have gone before us to build this wonderful temple and to lay the solid organizational and financial foundation that we enjoy today. Their hard work and sound stewardship has left a lasting legacy.

We're not without our challenges, of course. Like many organizations, nonprofit and otherwise, income has not kept pace with expenses recently. The economic storm that we've all been through for the past three years certainly takes some of the blame, and we on the board have been hard at work trimming expenses wherever possible to mitigate losses.

But the recession is not the only story here. Our temple, like many Jodo Shinshu temples, is evolving and its demographics are shifting. What was an almost exclusively Japanese American/Japanese Sangha a few decades ago has become decidedly more diverse. From my perspective, as long as we remain connected to and observant of OBT's cultural roots, this shift can be a positive one. (It's certainly been a good one for me, allowing me to connect with Jodo Shinshu!) And as Stan Shiigi wrote in this space last month, for Jodo Shinshu to remain alive and relevant, it must evolve, after all.

But as the temple's membership broadens and evolves, so too must our methods of building financial support for "the

facilities, resident minister, and other resources” that allow OBT to achieve its mission.

I don’t know about others who are new to the Jodo Shinshu community, but I’m a bit thick-skulled at times. For instance, it took awhile for me to realize that special services are times when temple members traditionally make a special donation to the temple, above and beyond regular membership dues. (I now know that, without these special donations, the temple really struggles to balance its books.)

Why did it take me so long to catch on to? Maybe because I wasn’t raised Jodo Shinshu or Japanese American so I didn’t know the protocol, or maybe because I’m too desensitized to pick up on the subtle donation envelope slipped into the OBT newsletter. These days we’re all inundated by fundraising appeals from dozens and dozens of worthy nonprofits each year. Like you, I’m used to having nonprofits ask me for money clearly and often, and to make a case for why my donation is important. So my observation is that as OBT’s membership continues to evolve, we will need to become less subtle about how we ask for financial support from our Sangha. We need to make sure that the temple’s request for support gets through to people like me, so that those of us who are new to the Jodo Shinshu community know how and when to provide support.

This column is also a farewell message for me. My wife, Ann Ishimaru, and our two kids, Mika and Kai, are moving to Seattle in mid-August. Ann has accepted a professorship at the University of Washington, and I’ll be telecommuting from our place in the Wallingford neighborhood. This temple, the JA community that surrounds it, and the broader Portland community have really become home for us (we moved to Portland in 1994), and we’ll miss everyone dearly. We’ll be sure to make return visits, but until then, take good care!
