The causes and conditions of the Enlightenment Reverend Yuki Sugahara

To reveal, with reverence, the true realization: It is the wondrous state attained through Amida's perfect benefiting of others; it is the ultimate fruition of supreme nirvana. (CWS, p.153)

-Shinran Shonin

The other day, I purchased the seeds of daikon sprouts and was trying to grow them. It is not that difficult according to the instruction. I just needed to put it in the dark for a few days, water them two, three times a day, and put it out in the sun for a few more days while again watering them a few times a day. I was expecting many daikon sprouts, but some of them grew well and some of them did not. Probably some of the seeds lain on top of others preventing the covered seeds to sprout.

I am sure some people will grow these seeds well, but there are others like me who cannot grow them well. We are growing the same seeds of the same plants using the same methods, but the results will be different according to the ability of the person.

I could say the same things about following the Buddhist path. For instance, there is a practice called the Six Paramitas. Although we may practice the same Six Paramitas, the results will be varied depending on the ability of each individual.

Here is a story about Vasubandhu and his friend. Vasubandhu and his friend were practicing the Buddhist path together. They got along very well and promised to meet each other at Tushita heaven of Maitreya when they passed away to continue their practice. One day, the friend passed away so Vasubandhu practiced hard to be born into the Tushita heaven. When Vasubandhu passed away, he was born into the Tushita heaven. He looked around for his friend, but he could not find him. It is said that Tushita heaven consists of two palaces. One is the Inside Palace ($Naig\bar{u}$) where the practitioner can focus on their practice to attain Buddhahood, and the

other is called the Outside Palace ($Geg\bar{u}$) where it is a fun place to be, perhaps like Disneyland. It is so much fun that the practitioner forgets what to focus on. According to the story, Vasubandhu's friend was born to the Outside Palace and was drowning in the joy of having fun. So, if the cause or practice is different, the result will also be different.

In our tradition, we follow the teaching taught in the *Larger Sutra*. The *Larger Sutra* contains three vows of Amida Buddha relating to the cause of our birth into the realm of enlightenment, called the Pure Land. The three vows are the 19th vow, 20th vow, and 18th vow.

In simple terms, the 19th vow and the 20th vow are for the practitioner of self-power. The practitioner makes effort to be born into the Pure Land by his/her own power. Again, the results will be varied if we rely on our own power because ability differs for each individual.

However, the 18th vow is the vow of Other Power. The cause of the birth is on the side of the Buddha so the result will be the same regardless of the ability of the individual. That is why Shinran Shonin stated after the quotation above: "When foolish beings possessed of blind passions, the multitudes caught in birth-and-death and defiled by evil karma, realize the mind and practice that Amida directs to them for their going forth, they immediately join the truly settled of the Mahayana." Since the cause of our birth is on the Buddha's side, all of us will join the stage of the truly settled and will be born into the Pure Land. It is not a matter of our ability.

The 18th Vow is not the path which selects individuals. It is the path for anyone. Unlike Vasubandhu and his friend who were separated, we are all able to meet in one place again. Regardless of age, appearance or ability, we are all fellow travelers on the Pure Land path.

Seeking candidates for OBT Board Shinya Ichikawa

The OBT Board is seeking candidates to fill 4 positions for the 2018-2020 OBT Board of Directors between now and early November when the election will be held by mail-in ballots. The OBT Board of Directors manages and controls the business and property of OBT. There are twelve directors. Each director holds office for a three-year term. Four directors are elected each year.

The year 2017 marks the end of the three-year terms for Katie Tamiyasu, Judy Hittle, Phaedra Urban, and Cathy Yarne.

The remaining Board members are:

2018: Ken Garner, Shinya Ichikawa, Kim Kono, Mie McGraw

2018- 2019: Chris Dart, Jerry Sumoge, Amy Peterson, Charles Reneau"

The four directors elected this year will serve from 2018 through 2020. Those leaving the Board this year are eligible for re-election.

All members running for the Board must be members at the time their names are placed on the ballot, must agree to serve on the Board at the time their names are placed on the ballot, and must maintain their membership throughout their term.

The schedule for the election process is as follows:

- Deadline for nominations is November 1, 2017.
- Ballots will be mailed out to members on Monday, November 5.
- Ballots should be returned to OBT by Sunday, November 25 at which time they will be counted and validated.
- Results will be announced early December at Sunday services and the December newsletter.

An exhibit not to be missed: Learn how bon odori (obon dance) has evolved in America. Wynn Kiyama, a member of Oregon Buddhist Temple, Adjunct Professor of Music at Portland State University, and Executive Director of Portland Taiko, has curated this exhibit which is the first of its kind now showing at ONLC.

The research started with his band in New York which performed live bon odori music, connecting him in 2014 to the work of Linda Akiyama who as a graduate student in the late 1980s interviewed Mrs. Helen Chizuko Iwanaga, widow of Reverend Yoshio Iwanaga, the Jodo Shinshu BCA minister responsible for introducing bon odori to the West Coast and British Columbia in the 1930s.

Mrs. Iwanaga gave photos to Akiyama who gave them to Kiyama, which form the basis of this exhibit.

Janice Okamoto who attended the opening, as did members of Reverend Iwanaga's family from San Jose, commented that the exhibit reminded her how much dancing at OBT's Obonfest over many years had been such an important part of her life.
