Shinran and Eshinni: A Love Story! Rev. Tadao Koyama

Happy February everyone! Does it always get so cold this time of year? This year it sure seems that winter is coming a lot later

than December. I remember our first February we had a few inches of snow on the temple grounds!

Valentine's day is celebrated in February. Many loving couples take this time to go out to dinner, and receive roses etc. When we think about Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, romance isn't really talked about all that much. However, one of the great love stories is about our own founder, Shinran Shonin and his wife Eshinni.

We actually have a lot to thank Eshinni for since she provided much insight in the life of Shinran and the times in Japan through her letters to her daughter Kakushinni. Shinran was ordained in the Tendai order. On the surface, the monks of Mt. Hiei were supposed to be celibate and free themselves of "earthly desires". This was never the case. Many of the monks had secret wives and children. That is where the euphemistic phrase "the back door of the temple" comes from. While the monks portrayed themselves to be these above reproach men in the front, they had secret families in the back.

Shinran could not resolve this desire, and it seems, could not stomach the hypocrisy of being told that he was to remain celibate when he probably was very aware of many of the monks had secret wives and families. It could be argued that Shinran was the first priest to openly be married.

It is not really known or confirmed if Shinran was married to Eshinni before or after he was banished from Kyoto. However, we do know that Shinran and Eshinni were raising their family in Echigo during Shinran's banishment. One of the reasons why this story is so inspiring is because Shinran and Eshinni were still able to do great work in spreading the Nembutsu teachings while still being married.

The Nembutsu teaching is not only meant for monks and clergy in the Buddhist world, but for everyone. Shinran himself was told supposed by Honen, "If being married makes you chant the Nembutsu, then get married. If it hinders you from saying Nembutsu, don't." Shinran definitely challenged the norms of his time by openly declaring to be married to Eshinni. Eshinni was also essential to the spreading of the Nembutsu teaching as she had access to capital and property to further assist in this endeavor.

This really helps me to appreciate my wife, Rev. Cyndi Yasaki. The partnership between us is something I will always cherish! Sorry, I think I am feeling a bit romantic myself!

Portland Taiko (PT) has been entertaining audiences throughout the NW for the past 30 years, blending "the tradition of Japanese taiko

drumming with a sense of Asian American identity, creativity, and empowerment."

Portland Taiko and the OBT have a mutually beneficial relationship. For the past 9 years, PT has rented space from the OBT for practices, classes, storage, in the basement & garage, and a room in the annex (PT office). PT and the OBT are separate, non-profit organziations.

PT's current contract allows them access to the temple basement Monday-Thursday evenings, and Thursday during the day. PT pays additional rent for any use of the temple basement outside of these times. If they are not using the space, OBT is allowed to use it upon request. This rental agreement benefits the temple by having visible usage of the temple in the evenings and regular rental income. While it isn't always perfect, both PT and the OBT have been able to work together to maintain a healthy, beneficial relationship.
