Members from all over the world also come to pay their respects as well. Traditional Japanese music called Gagaku is heard every day, and the chanting echoes through the halls of Hongwanji.

I look forward to celebrating Hoonko with you all and let us come together to thank Shinran Shonin for sharing a teaching that all of us can relate to!

"The purpose of the Oregon Buddhist Temple is to ensure that the Jodo Shinshu Sangha have the facilities, resident minister and other resources they need to share the Buddha-Dharma in their daily lives and during their major life events."

Here are some things the Board has been working on:

- Lanterns in the Onaijin have been repaired and are currently being polished. Watch and see if you can tell when they've been rehung.
- We have a Safety Maintenance group that is looking into improvements, i.e. handrails, back exit ramp, entry rugs, repairing the pews. This will be an ongoing project.
- There will be a General Meeting for Members of the sangha on February 23rd. Some of the items to be covered will be the Audit for 2024; Financial Report for 2024, along with a proposed budget for 2025; an amendment to the ByLaws; perhaps a look ahead to plans from the BEC (Buddhist Education Committee), Dharma School, and

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OBWA. Please come and join us. The meeting will be conducted after the morning service.

- We are also beginning to look at hosting the 2027 NW Buddhist Convention. It will be in February 2027. Do you have any interesting ideas or do you want to be a part of the planning committee? We'd love to have your input and it's not too early to begin.
- I hope you know that our Board meetings are open to members of the Sangha. We continue to meet via Zoom.

It may give you some insight as to the behind-the-scenes work that goes on at OBT. It may even encourage you to become a board member.

Looking forward to 2025, full of hope, compassion and understanding. Please continue to be an active part of our Sangha; we need everyone's effort to successfully move forward.

Happy New Year from the OBWA! 2024 flew by like... a dragon. In December, our talented members participated in the OBT craft

fair and Mochitsuki. We will join together at the Temple for the last day of 2024 and then again for the first day of the 2025 new year. On January 1st, we will be consuming Ozoni, a dashi broth with mochi (symbolizing flexibility) being the highlighted ingredient.

Our final OBWA meeting of 2024 was held on December 21st. This was also our OBWA annual meeting. We had a packed agenda which included:

- OBWA By-laws membership change: We voted to update the language in our By-laws to be more inclusive. Under Membership, our By-laws now reads that "any person who is interested in the principles of the OBWA shall be eligible for membership..." and that "payment of annual membership dues will establish membership." [Anyone interested in joining us, please reach out to Amy Peterson or me and we will answer any questions that you may have about joining the OBWA. The OBWA dues will remain at \$20 per member in 2025.]

Year End and New Year's Day Services Shinya Ichikawa

Year End Service (Joya-e 除夜会) -

December 31

This service is held at all temples on New Year's Eve to express gratitude for the past year and to reflect on the interdependency of all life, and on all things that have made it possible for one to live through the year.

The character "E" (会) is usually read "kai" and means a group or association. In the Buddhist reading of "E" it means "a gathering of the Sangha."

Though not an activity at Honzan, temples with a large bell called bonsho will toll the bell 108 times on New Year's Eve. This is called joya no kane or "bell of the last night." It is symbolic ringing away of the 108 passions that afflict human beings and bind them to the world of delusion. It is a reminder of the need to free oneself from the entanglements of self-centeredness as on faces the New Year. There is no way to know whether the coming year will be fortunate or unfortunate, but in the Nembutsu, whichever it is, everything will be all right.

New Year's Day Service (Shusho-e 修正会 "observenew year-gathering") – January 1

This is a gathering in reflect upon and learn from past mistakes, and with renewed resolution, endeavor to live a life in the Nembutsu.

The observance of Shusho-e originated in the Nara Period and lasted for seven days in all the temples thoughout Japan. Homes are cleaned debts paid before the new year. Oshogatsu (芝正月) or New Years customs vary from prefecture to prefecture but the foods and decorations all have to do with symbols of long life, happiness, prosperity, and fertility.

The Shusho-e begins the cycle of those holidays and festivals which root one ever deeper in the Buddhadharma.


