#### **General Meeting Summary by Judy Hittle**

 Membership Report by Yoshi Ono, Membership Chair for 2014.

The Membership Chair for 2015, is Al Ono.

• Update on new Minister by Scott Winner, 2014 OBT President. Scott reported that we are still in the process of ironing out an agreement between Idaho-Oregon Temple and OBT, in regards to the supervising minister, Rev. Fujimoto. The first six months have been scheduled with Rev. Fujimoto coming to OBT at least once a month. The second six months will be scheduled in March. In discussions with the Bishop it will be around 6 months to a year before a new minister will be assigned to OBT.

Scott Winner and Ken Garner have been asked to reexamine the existing minister's contract.

Yoshi Ono will take the lead in the hiring of a new minister.

- OBWA report by Jayne Ichikawa. A handout was distributed showing the OBWA activities for 2014. Jayne also reported that there are 84 paid members, 5 associate members, and 35 honorary members.
- Dharma School Report by Amy Peterson. A handout was distributed showing the various activities the Dharma School, YBA, and the Girl Scout Troop 43720, participated in during 2014. Amy also showed a separate Income-Expense-Balance for the three groups.
- Buddhist Education Committee and Minister's Assistants Report by Brenda Fugate and Etsu Osaki.

The BEC consists of the Minister, Minister's Assistants, Dharma School Coordinator and OBT President. The committee meets every 2 months or as needed, and is open to members who are interested in helping to plan various educational

activities to promote Buddhism throughout the year. Stan Shiigi has also assisted with the BEC.

The BEC also oversees the library.
The new librarian is Chris Dart with assistance from Susan Endecott.

- Maintenance Report by Ray Fukunaga. A handout was distributed, showing the various maintenance activities throughout the year. The most recent repairs were with the basement kitchen ventilation systems and the elevator.
- Financial Report by Elaine Yuzuriha, OBT
  Financial Officer. A handout was distributed
  showing the income and expenses for the 2014
  calendar year. Although the report shows a
  decrease in Total Expenses, compared with
  2013, the Total Income also decreased by a
  substantial amount which left us with an increase
  in the deficit.

An audit is scheduled in February by Marilyn Achterman and Chris Dart.

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#### RELIGION - WHO NEEDS IT? By Etsuko Osaki

Rev James Hozen Warrick of Seattle Betsuin lead participants in discussing some questions at the Hoonko seminar held on January 10<sup>th</sup>. People were divided into smaller groups and each discussed the following questions and came up with various answers.

- 1. Were you born a Buddhist or were you a convert? Almost 3 out of 5 said they were born Buddhists. Those who said they were converts had different reasons. One person claimed he was not a convert because he had no previous religion.
- 2. Is Buddhism a religion? If so why, if not why not? Buddhism has no god or deity. However, all religions have a philosophy and a way of life. One group claimed Buddhism is a religion, a philosophy and a way of life.
- 3. Do you think everyone needs religion? If so why, if not why not? Depends on the definition of religion. There are atheists and agnostics. People may be spiritual but not have a religion.
- 4. Why do you come to temple? Some come to learn about the religion, some come for the social, for the fellowship, kids come to please their parents, some come for help, for the food, to make new friends.
- 5. Do you consider yourself spiritual?
- 6. Do you think Jodoshinshu is real Buddhism? Yes, why. No, why?
- 7. What is religion? What is spirituality? Religion has certain beliefs, how to live ones life. Spirituality is a way of life, a journey inside of self. Kids who have religion or spirituality do better later in life. Jodoshinshu doesn't talk much about #5.

Buddhism teaches us to live in harmony with all things. Listening is most important. It was a very meaningful day for those who attended. Thank you, Rev. Warrick.
