Why we Say "Namo Amida Butsu" Rev. Tadao Koyama

Happy March everyone! We are now out of the winter season and saying hello to spring! While the weather warms up, we

still have quite a bit of rain that may keep us indoors. This month Rev. Cyndi and I will embark on a small adventure returning to Japan, specifically Kyoto! I was privileged to live in Kyoto for two years of my life training to become a minister. During this time, I met some life-long friends who I hope to reconnect with, as well as participating in services at our head temple of Nishi Hongwanji.

If we are lucky, we might be able to see some beautiful Sakura blooming around the city. I know for a fact that I will be filled with the feeling of natsukashii (nostalgia) during this time.

I also recollect many of the lessons that I received while attending classes at Chubutsu. One of the sensei that talked to us about our school of Jodo Shinshu lectured on the idea of Buddhist awakening. For us as Jodo Shinshu Buddhists, our singular practice is to say "Namo Amida Butsu". This is because we are encouraged to awaken and accept the true nature of ourselves.

We "Namo Amida Butsu" because we are ordinary beings who are not fully enlightened. This is part of an acknowledgement of our human nature which can be selfish, and conceited. We are not always this way, and I would like to believe that most of the time we are conducting ourselves in the best ways possible. We say "Namo Amida Butsu" because this practice is perfectly made for us to engage in on a daily-life basis.

The vast majority of us cannot devote weeks or months of our time to go to meditation or Buddhist retreats to cultivate our merit and our spiritual fortitude. According to our founder, Shinran Shonin, the Nembutsu (Namo Amida Butsu) is the culmination of all of the Buddhist practices that are needed for enlightenment into one phrase. Taking refuge in the Nembutsu is our surest method to enlightenment for Amida Buddha's vows were specifically stated for the sake of all sentient beings.

Springtime is often synonymous with the melting of the ice of our passions and the awakening to the working of Amida. This is also reflected in Namo Amida Butsu. Many visitors who come to the temple may wonder why we always

place our hands together and say this phrase over and over again. This is our practice, this our refuge.

I heard this from Bishop Harada at a recent workshop:

"Gomonshu Koshin Ohtani reports how in Japan, a sign on a temple wall lists a set of

rules for hearing.

- 1. You should listen as if you are hearing it for the very first time.
- 2. You should listen as if the message is for you alone.
- 3. You should listen as if this is the last time you will ever do so in your life.

I'm certain that all of you have heard of the Southern California Wildfires. You probably felt sad for the damages that have been caused. Remember, interconnectedness? No, I'm not speaking of climate change, although there probably is a story there too. I'm speaking of the people in Southern California. You've heard by now of the Pasadena Buddhist Temple that was saved by a neighbor who literally jumped over the wall to put out the starting of a fire that had begun to burn on the Temple. That act of kindness, saved the Temple. But did you hear about the families who experienced total loss of their possessions? The extent is not yet known, but many were temple families. It wasn't just in Pasadena, but in other Southern California towns. We are probably not personally affected by this, unless we are related to someone who was unfortunate to experience such losses. Remember, a little act of kindness from all of us, could help someone in need, - just as the neighbor stopped the fire on the Pasadena Temple.

As you enter our temple, you will notice a collection box for this Southern California Wildfire Relief Fund promoted by the BCA (Buddhist Churches of America). Please know that any contribution amount helps and collectively we can help someone from a temple family or their community. Please consider donating to this fund. We will have this collection box available for the month of March, at the end of which, we will forward all funds collected to the BCA.

The Minidoka Swing Band Concert on April 4, 2025 in Hillsboro Elaine Yuzuriha and Laura Baxter

The Minidoka Swing Band began in 2007 by Robbie Tsuboi, who wanted to create a youth band to teach her Jr. JACL group Unite People about the internment of Japanese Americans through the music of the World War 2 era. The band was led by former Cleveland High School band director Larry Nobori. Their goal was to attend and entertain at the Minidoka Camp Pilgrimage in July, 2008. The band has stayed active under the leadership of Larry Nobori and Laura Baxter, who began managing the band after the untimely passing of Robbie Tsuboi in 2010. During those years, the band traveled to Japan to perform in 2015, performed at the National JACL Conference in Seattle, played at the Northwest Buddhist Convention held in Portland in 2014, and toured Northern California in 2019. They have recorded two CD's and were featured on the front page of the Wall Street Journal in 2010.



Since 2012, the Minidoka Swing Band has practiced in the basement of Oregon Buddhist Temple. They have been very active playing around the Portland Metro area, and as far as Eugene to Hillsboro to Woodland, WA, to Gresham. We continue to entertain as we educate the public about the Japanese American Internment of World War 2. Under the directorship of Al Kato, former Jesuit High School band director, and management of Elaine and Todd Yuzuriha, the band continued to flourish in 2024. Sadly, Al passed away much too soon last September, after having played with the band as our soloing trumpet since 2016. This has been a tremendous blow to the band.

The Band has a full lineup of performances happening this year in 2025! One special performance that is open to the public will be on April 4th, 2025 in Hillsboro, OR. This is a ticketed event and will be held inside the beautiful Walter's Cultural Arts Center, 527 E Main St, Hillsboro, OR 97123, Friday evening from 7:30 to 9:30pm. This performance is supported by a City of Hillsboro Performance Series Grant and directly supports the Minidoka Swing Band with a portion

of the proceeds benefiting The Immigrant Story. MSB will team up with Unite People, led by Dr. Connie Masuoka, to tell the story of WWII Japanese Americans who were taken from their homes and businesses on the West Coast in 1942 and interned behind barbed wire in assembly centers, 10 concentration camps, and military prisons. A Memoir of Love, Imprisionment, and Protest. Her novel is a "compelling and prismatic love story" of her parent's "defiance in the face of injustices" during WWII and "how their story echoes across generations." As a licensed psychotherapist, specializing in community trauma, and an activist, Dr. Ina is uniquely qualified to share her family's story, while connecting it to modern-day mass incarceration and treatment of immigrants.

2025 Japanese American Community Graduation Banquet Ann Shintani

Founded in 1947, the greater Portland area Japanese-American community has been celebrating graduating high school seniors associated with participating organizations, and those of Japanese-American ancestry in the local area. There are many volunteers that make this event happen, and the Oregon Buddhist Temple is one of several participating organizations – others include the Portland and Gresham-Troutdale chapters of the Japanese American Citizen's League, other local churches and social groups. The community also offers several scholarships to students that are members of one of the participating organizations (there are some exceptions).

The 2024 graduation banquet speaker, Tiffany Tamaribuchi, Artistic Director of Portland Taiko, shared her experiences of breaking ground as one of the first female in an art form traditionally reserved for males, and other struggles. Her persistence and dedication inspired students to seeks ways to inspire and help others. The 2025 graduation banquet speaker is Hanako Wakatsuki-Chong, Executive Director of the Japanese American Museum of Oregon.

This luncheon is an opportunity for our community to celebrate our high school graduates for 2025, Avery Hughes-

Davis and Midori Carrollo. The Community Graduation Banquet luncheon will take place on Sunday, May 4, 1:00pm at the Riverside Golf and Country Club in Portland, OR. Sashiko is a practical craft that prolongs the life of everyday garments, bags or coverings so it can be passed on to the next generation. This workshop was originally conducted by Setsu Ueno on

April 28, 2001, and Setsu's daughter continued with the same

material for the next generation of crafters. The class roster from 24 years ago has some familiar names!

We welcome requests for items to make for the temple, such as nenju case, aprons, and anesan kaburi (head coverings for kitchen workers). We can also make or teach you how to make custom size happi, yukata or monpe (farmer's pants).




