To Never Abandon Rev. Tadao Koyama

Happy July everyone! July for many people marks the middle of summertime. The weather is hot, we have the 4th of July fireworks to look at, BBQs, and for many temples, Obon! As we enter Obon season,

we begin to take out our yukata, various fans, and kachi-kachi in preparation for all of the dancing and fun!

Obon is still one of my favorite times of year, as it marks a time I am able to meet many friends, eat good food, and dance my heart out to fun songs like "Eijyanaika", "Tanko Bushi", and "Soran Bushi". The spiritual meaning behind this time has also become more apparent to me since becoming a priest.

One of my responsibilities is to visit the cemeteries again during Obon season to chant sutras for those who wish to observe the passing of their ancestors. This is also an especially busy time for the priests in Japan, as they have to visit all of their members' houses to chant in front of their obutsudan. When I chant Amida Kyo during the cemetery visitations, I am reminded of the Wasan or hymn that our founder Shinran Shonin wrote on the Amida Sutra:

"Seeing the sentient beings of the Nembutsu Throughout the worlds, countless as particles, in the ten quarters, The Buddha grasps and never abandons them, And therefore is named "Amida"."

This wasan perfectly describes the feeling of appreciation and awareness that we can feel during this time. While dancing, drinking beer, and making new friends is always fun, this season provides us with an opportunity to reflect on the teachings that our ancestors helped to impart on us from generations ago. When we think about it, the number of ancestors related to us are as countless as particles within the ten quarters of existence. Yet, Amida Buddha still embraces them all equally without fail.

The name "Amida" can also imply the concept of "immeasurable" or beyond our concept of space and time. This is because the amount of wisdom and compassion that Amida gives to us, gave to our past ancestors, and will give to our descendants for the future is truly without measure. With this in mind, we can dance with a great sense of joy and wonder of the innumerable causes and conditions that led us to the nembutsu path and to our encounter with Amida Buddha.

The temple has been the home and the center for many Obon seasons of the past in the United States and from ancient Japan. So many of our ancestors have taken part in this festival and have passed on the love of dance and the temple onto us. When we dance, let's remember them with a deep sense of gratitude and love.

OBT President's Message Cathy Yarne

Hello Sangha,

The Bishop of the Buddhist Churches of America (BCA) has a weekly podcast

that can be accessed on-line or Dial-the-Dharma (1 800 817-7918). Recently the topic was Growing Our Sangha. Bishop Harada noted the "sacrifices and dedication of our founding pioneers who must have seen and felt a tremendous value in the teachings and the Nembutsu" to build and establish the temples we have today.

In his talk he stated that, similar to all religious organizations in the US, over the past 10 years the BCA has seen a 28% decline in membership. Although I don't know the exact numbers, I'm confident this is true for our temple too. The decline in membership creates challenges for temples, particularly small temples who still must maintain and support their temple facilities, programs and minister. These challenges are also taxing on the leadership and sangha since we are essentially an "all volunteer" organization. OBT is not exempt from these challenges. We are always in need of volunteers and people willing to take charge of specific tasks.

One particular statement from Bishop Harada's podcast resonated with me personally. Bishop said the pioneers of our temples saw and felt a "tremendous value in the teachings and the Nembutsu" to establish the temples. I realize, that I too believe there is value in the teachings and the Nembutsu, not just for myself but for others. This belief has motivated me to take an active role at our temple. Like the pioneers who built the first OBT temple in 1910, I'd like our temple to continue to be a vital resource for anyone who wants to listen and learn about Buddhism. I know I am not alone in this belief. Recently, we received a donation from someone who does not live in Oregon. They asked that we "please continue our dedicated efforts to share the Buddha Dharma." If you too share this belief, I encourage you to become a member of our temple and the BCA. Your pledge supports our ministers, dharma programs and the operation and maintenance of our

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buildings. Your pledge shows us you value the Oregon Buddhist Temple and its mission to share the dharma. If you've already made a pledge for 2024, your support is very much appreciated. Thank you!

The Simple Life of Pets Kristen Wong

What is making me happy lately is a podcast called "Creature Preacher" which is centered on a woman, named Nancy, who talks to animals, both living and in the

beyond. While this sounds like a hoax, I certainly hope it isn't. For all the craziness and anxiety in our world, hearing what our pets think is a welcome concept.

"Does my dog like me?" seems to be the most common question that callers will ask. This is a very self-centered question and one that is very human. From the Buddhist perspective, I want to know "What makes a happy life?" The answer from my dog's viewpoint seems like it would be simple: A lot of good food, belly rubs and a backyard with squirrels.

But can the answer be that simple? Maslow's hierarchy of needs suggest that there are several more layers to this list to be happy. Among them is safety and at the top is self-actualization. I know my dog lives in a secure and stable environment, however, does my dog realize his purpose and is his purpose independent or dependent on my happiness? And does being self-actualized actually mean that one is happy? Can one be happy without being self-actualized? Deep questions require simple answers in my case. And for the answers, I do not have any.

Nancy the animal communicator often says that our pets are happy when we are happy and vice versa. They just want us to enjoy life. In a self-actualized existence, for a human or dog this could mean that we know what we like and we have the freedom to be creative. But when all is done, does this really matter? Do animals have the answers to what makes a happy life?

Nancy says they do and that it's about our connections and our relationships. Not what food or how many toys we give them. It's about the time we spent together and what we were doing when we were together. Were we watching the box of moving pictures (what the dog sees) and ignoring our loved ones? Or were we engaged, talking to them, keeping a hand on their backs? Did we take walks together and just smell the air? Our furry friends know what life is about and I appreciate knowing what they think. It is that simple and it is a good reminder of the practice of Buddhism.
